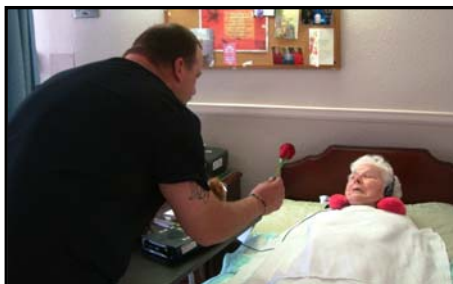
Sweet Heart Dance Loved By All

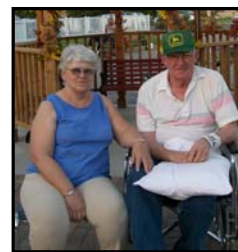
We also have special discounts available for volunteers who volunteer 4 hours a month or more and free membership for employees.

New Program- Elders on Email

That's right. Elders will now have the capability to send and receive email as well as webcam using Skype. Would you like to keep in touch with your loved one more often? Would you enjoy a face-to-face visit? The purpose of this program is to help families stay in touch more often. This system uses a large touch-screen computer designed for easy use by seniors and other folks who have trouble using a standard keyboard, mouse, or other computer features. Intergenerational- Building Relationships Between Young and Old

Many grandparents and grandchildren have special relationships. Often you will hear a grandparent say, “If I would have known how much fun grandkids were, I would have had them first.” While parents keep track of children’s chores, homework, friends, activities, grades, misbehavior and attitude, grandparents are able to love and accept their grandchildren unconditionally.

Intergenerational programs focus on deepening the special relationship between children and elders. Bent County HealthCare Center and Kountry Kids Learning Center work hard to create intergenerational opportunities unique in Colorado in our Eden® home. Recently, children and elders joined together to design, paste, and build special valentines and later in the week decorated special valentine cookies. Elders smiled and giggled at these little people’s energy and the children talked and worked with their special “grandparent.” The children expressed their creativity while the elders assisted and encouraged.

It is in our Eden® home where this very special and unique intergenerational program exists. Partnerships of this sort between long-term care facilities and childcare centers are rare. Of the 225 nursing homes in Colorado, only 5 others have licensed childcare centers under the same roof. Of these, only 3 others have organized intergenerational activities between the children and elders. The Directors of these programs know they have something unique and special and wonder why more nursing homes don’t see the truth- children and elders need one another. Many of the nursing homes state, “We are a nursing home.” Yes, well Bent County HealthCare Center is a nursing home also, but we are *much much* more and we are making a difference in the lives of your loved ones!

New Program- Massage Therapy

Twice a month, Amber Hall a state licensed and nationally certified massage therapist, visits the HealthCare Center to bring her healing touch to the elders free of charge. She treats six elders for approximately 30 minutes each, either in their bed or wheelchair or in her treatment room. She states the importance of touch and how clinical touch is very different from therapeutic touch. A therapeutic touch brings a sense of comfort plus the added benefits of the tissue massage. It is a very comforting and healing experience for the elders. Amber has set up a treatment room in the building to accommodate extra sessions for anyone who is interested in her services. New Program- Aroma Therapy

The use of essential oils can be used to decrease anxiety, reduce pain, eliminate headaches, induce sleep and give an increased sense relaxation and happiness. These benefits could possibly decrease the amount of medications used to treat similar conditions. Aroma therapy is used throughout the HealthCare Center. Individual diffusers are placed in elders' rooms to decrease agitation. Large diffusers are placed in common areas to increase the overall atmosphere. Special pampering shampoos, conditioners, and body washes are used during baths. All these enhance the environment of the elders' home.

Have Mending?

Mending is available for elders and their families by two volunteers- JoAnne Miller and Zola Six. Mending is picked up regularly. If you have a mending project, mark the item with the elder's name and leave it with the laundry. Hems, buttons, and tears are no problem for these wonderful ladies!!!

Does your loved one need a place to go during the day that will make sure they are taken care of, give them something to do yet have fun?

Adult day services may be able to alleviate your worries and help your loved one be healthy and happy. This is a day program with lots of activities, healthy food, and professional staff. We are open 5 days a week and can transport your loved to and from the program!
